- >> Outreach officially became a program, where Youth Central engages vulnerable youth in Calgary via creative and volunteer outlets through the Calgary Young Offender Centre, Discovering Choices schools and other community organizations

CALGARY YOUTH FOUNDATION

Involving youth in a hands-on approach to philanthropy, the Calgary Youth Foundation provides youth with an opportunity to create positive change in their community.

>> In the 2010-2011 school year, the Calgary Youth Foundation funded nine youth driven projects totalling \$10,000. Funded projects included a youth painted mural celebrating Chinatown's 100th year anniversary and a project to engage young people in Morley, AB.

>> In partnership with the Mayor's Youth Council, the Calgary Youth Foundation awarded Western Canada High School's Environment Club and West Island College the Jack Leslie Youth Environment Grant.



CONOCOPHILLIPS YOUTH OF DISTINCTION AWARDS

The ConocoPhillips Youth of Distinction Awards recognize deserving youth ages 13-18 for the remarkable ways in which they have chosen to live. The awards are non-academic; rather, they focus on leadership, friendship, overcoming personal challenges and community service. There were seven categories of awards: Advocacy, Environmentalism - Individual, Environmentalism - Group, Leadership, Peer Support, Perseverance and Volunteerism.

>> In 2011, we received 118 nominations with 180 youth across Calgary and area represented. There were seven fantastic recipients.



MAYOR'S YOUTH COUNCIL

The Mayor's Youth Council consists of youth ages 13-18 who choose topics relevant to youth and report their findings to the City of Calgary. Along with advising the municipal government on issues important to youth, the MYC offers youth input to a variety of citywide organizations.

- >> In the 2010-2011 school year, the Mayor's Youth Council created promotional videos, blogged about Calgary events and worked on a healthy relationships awareness campaign.
- >> MYC recognized Westside Recreation Centre and Cardel Place as Youth Endorsed City Spaces.
- >> MYC members also developed a video highlighting youth opinions about municipal spending for the City of Calgary budget.

OUTREACH

We engage at-risk youth in Calgary via creative and volunteer outlets through the Calgary Young Offender Centre, Discovering Choices Outreach schools and other community organizations.

- >> During the 2010-2011 school year, more youth participated in the program and the number of volunteer hours significantly increased. Discovering Choices Bowness and Downtown Youth Councils completed a total of 730 hours in their school and community. Soon, we are planning to expand to a third location due to their success.
- >> Outreach has also seen a significant increase in youth wanting to participate in the Bounce Back program at the Calgary Young Offender Centre. On average, the group has doubled in size due to the program's popularity.





TD YOUTH EARTH AMBASSADORS

The TD Youth Earth Ambassadors was created with the intention of bringing together individual high school environment clubs. For years, these schools worked alone without any collaboration. Now, they come together, share information and work together at change.

>> This year, there were four member schools and three partner schools. They organized a city-wide bike-in challenge, a Green Life Challenge, and a large-scale volunteer project at Heritage Park. They also engaged their feeder junior high schools in eco-based learning.

YOUTH ARE AWESOME

Youth Are Awesome is a blog written by youth for youth. Launched in July 2009, Youth Are Awesome is updated daily, and uses a combination of text, video, pictures and the latest in new media.

>> In 2011, Youth Are Awesome grew in more ways than one. Telus came on board as the first major sponsor of the program, and as a result, Youth Central was able to complete a re-design in June. This made the website more modern and professional.

>> We reached a record of over 12,000 unique hits to the site in one month, with visitors from Canada, the United States and all over the world.

>> Youth Are Awesome also spread in the Calgary community, with youth interest being so high that we attracted a committee of over 40 bloggers between the ages of 12 and 18.





YOUTH VOLUNTEER CORPS

The purpose of the Youth Volunteer Corps (YVC) is to provide meaningful team-based volunteer opportunities to young people between the ages of 12 and 18 in partnership with over 150 community agencies and events.

>>> YVC had an incredible year that saw our 2,440 youth volunteers completing 767 projects. A few of these projects included a new collaboration between Youth Central and Starbucks where youth worked alongside Starbucks partners at St. Stephen's Church, an Inn From the Cold location, and Heritage Park.

>>> The annual YVC fundraiser Empty Bowls raised \$3,600 for at-risk youth.

YOUTH VOLUNTEER CORPS IN SCHOOLS

Through the creation of school clubs and presentations, YVC in Schools engages 21 junior and senior high schools by encouraging students to create their own volunteer opportunities that help their school and community. On a yearly basis, YVC in Schools completes about 20,000 hours of volunteering.

>>> Our most active club, Sir Winston Churchill, reached 300 members and completed almost 6,000 hours of volunteering this year!



YOUTH WEEK CALGARY

Calgary and area communities, agencies and businesses come together to host events, projects and offer free or cheap services during a week-long celebration of youth. Through Youth Week, we stimulate growth and expansion in programs and services focused on young Calgarians.

>> In 2011, Youth Week was run by the Mayor's Youth Council for the first time with support from Calgary's youth-friendly Mayor Naheed Nenshi. An estimated 11,322 youth were in attendance at 57 events. Twenty-one of these events were held at various junior and senior high schools. Overall, we held 16 more events and gave out 267 more prizes than we did in 2010.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Directors of Youth Central Society

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Youth Central Society, which comprise the statement of financial position as at October 31, 2011, and the statements of operations and changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, the society derives revenue from (specify type of contributions affected) the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the society and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to contributions, excess of revenues over expenses, current assets and net assets.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we might have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the contributions referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Youth Central Society as at October 31, 2011 and the results of its operations and its cash flow for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

1. BASIS OF PRESENTATION

Youth Central Society ("the Society") is incorporated under the Societies' Act of Alberta. The Society's goal is to motivate all Canadians, corporations, governments, community groups, schools, businesses and individuals to promote and deliver a better quality of life for Calgary's youth. The Society is a registered charity as defined under paragraph 149 of the Income Tax Act, and therefore, is not subject to income tax.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Revenue recognition

The Society follows the restricted method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions related to programs are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund when received. Restricted contributions related to general operations are recognized as revenue of the General Fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Restricted contributions related to capital assets are recognized as the related capital assets are amortized.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the General Fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates include providing for amortization of capital assets. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Donated materials and services

Donated materials and services are recorded in the financial statements at fair market value when fair market value can be reasonably estimated and the materials or services are used in the normal course of business and would otherwise have been purchased. During the year, no amounts were recorded for donated materials and services.

The Society's programs benefit from substantial services in the form of volunteer time, which is not recorded in the Society's financial statements, because of the difficulty of determining their fair value.

3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The company's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Company is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximate their carrying values, unless otherwise noted.
